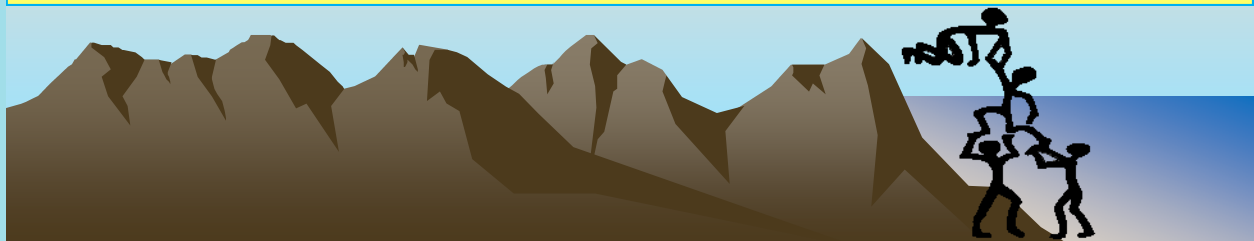

The program is open-entry (meaning you can enroll at anytime). Individuals who are 16 years or older and have not received their high school diploma are eligible for the program.

Services Provided:

- **Adult Basic Education:** this program is for those students who may need additional academic work in reading, writing, and mathematics. This is especially true if someone has been out of school for a very long time. This may eventually lead to preparing for the Official GED Exam.
- **General Education Development: (GED)** This program specifically prepares the students for the Official GED Exam. Students are given the GED Practice Test once a month to determine if they are ready for the Official GED Exam.
- To help us serve you better, an assessment test is administered. From this test, we can determine your reading, mathematics, language, and spelling levels. With the results, we set up individual lesson plans to ensure that you pass the Official GED Exam.

- TUBERCULOSIS, SCREENING AND FOLLOW-UP: We screen contacts of active cases of tuberculosis, and foreign-born individuals. Call for appointment.
- FLU SHOTS: Target population is individuals over age 65 and/or people with chronic illness. Held in late fall in Bloomfield, Aztec and Blanco.
- COMMUNICABLE DISEASE FOLLOW-UP: We follow up on cases of reportable diseases such as salmonella, hepatitis, whooping cough, measles, and tuberculosis. Services are available to individuals with reportable diseases.
- WOMEN, INFANTS, AND CHILDREN (WIC) NUTRITIONAL PROGRAM:
 - Services are available by appointment and eligibility is based on family income and size. We serve women with children up to age 5, pregnant women, and postpartum women.

Juvenile Drug Court Program: Is a court ordered four phase intensive outpatient treatment program for adjudicated youth. The program uses the Hazeldon “Adolescent Recovery Plan” and the “Matrix Model”. The program includes individual, group, and family counseling, random urinalysis, and alcohol testing, GPS monitoring, SCRAM Monitoring, life skills, community service, mentoring, Medicine Man Services, After-Care, ROPES Course, pro-social activities, mentoring, transportation, vocational preparation, and the educational component of Grade Court.

Grade Court: Is a court ordered program for youth who are in trouble with the law and are not in school and/or have a grade less than a “C” on their last report card. Grade Court has the participants write down their daily homework assignments and meet with their teachers daily to make sure they understand the assignments and their weekly progress report. The participants review their daily homework assignments and their weekly progress report with their parents and turn them into the court weekly. The participants and their parents appear before the Judge monthly to review their progress. After the participants gets two report cards in a row with all “C’s” or better they graduate from Grade Court and are given a two-year scholarship to San Juan College that can be used for Certificate Programs or Academic Degrees.

Both Programs: use a host of rewards and sanctions when appropriate. Some of the incentives include movie passes, climbing wall, ice cream coupons, dinner coupons, etc. The sanctions include weekend detention, work detail, endurance, Jury Duty, community service, Youth in Progress Life Skills.

In summer participants are selected to participate in an adventure challenge with the Farmington Police Department. If participants are behind in their reading level, they are assigned to the summer reading program where they work with a specialist to improve their reading skills.

- **Information & Referral:** Law Center staffs tell callers about their legal rights and suggest ways they can resolve their problems. We also tell people how they can contact other offices and agencies to get services.
- **Legal Representation:** If you have a problem related to your disability that falls within our priorities, a Law Center attorney or advocate may accept your case for representation.
- **Systems Advocacy:** The Law Center works to protect the rights of people with disabilities and to increase or improve available services. Our efforts often change laws, regulations, policies and practices. These changes can empower individuals

with disabilities to be more independent and productive, and enable them to be included in their community and the workforce.

- Self-Advocacy Training and Education: The Law Center provides training and education about the legal rights of people with disabilities. The audience for our trainings includes individuals with disabilities, their family members and service providers.

- The main purpose of the NNPSR program is to reduce dependency on public assistance by promoting job preparation and work and family stability. Other purposes are to prevent and reduce the prevalence of out-of-wedlock pregnancies and encourage the formation, maintenance and strengthening of two parent families.
- Time Limited Cash Assistance: The NNPSR program provides monthly cash assistance for basic needs such as food, clothing and housing to eligible families for a maximum of 60 months. Assistance received from any other state or tribal TANF programs counts toward this time limit.
- Support Services: The NNPSR program seeks out educational and employment opportunities for its customers and makes referrals for those who are job ready. In addition, NNPSR screens for issues related to substance abuse, mental health and domestic violence and makes referrals to appropriate services.

Qualifications: All applicants must meet financial, non-financial supplemental eligibility requirements to qualify for assistance.

Deprivation: Families that include a child (under the age of 18) deprived of financial support from a legal parent because of disability, death, continued absence from the home, or the under/unemployment of both parents may qualify for assistance.

Income: All applicants must meet certain income guidelines

Residency: Applicants must live within the NNPSR program's service delivery area for at least 30 days prior to applying for benefits. The NNPSR service delivery area covers the entire Navajo Nation and recognized near reservation communities.

Citizenship: All members of the filing unit must be citizens of the United States.

Child Support Enforcement: All single Heads of Household and caretakers must cooperate fully and seek child support payment from the absent parent by applying with the Navajo Nation Child Support Enforcement program. Failure to cooperate may result in benefits being denied or terminated.

Orientation: All customers are required to attend an orientation session. A test of Adult Basic Education (TABE) will be administered for those who are required to complete work participation.

Work Participation: All adults in the benefit group are required to meet work participation hours of at least 24 hours per week in authorized work activities. A personal responsibility plan will be developed to identify hours and work activities.

Custodial Parents: Applicants, who are not the biological or legal parents of children in their benefit group, must provide legal custody/guardianship documents or show proof that they are pursuing legal custody, to be potentially eligible.

What documents should I bring? The entire interview process takes about an hour. You can help your caseworker by bringing the following:

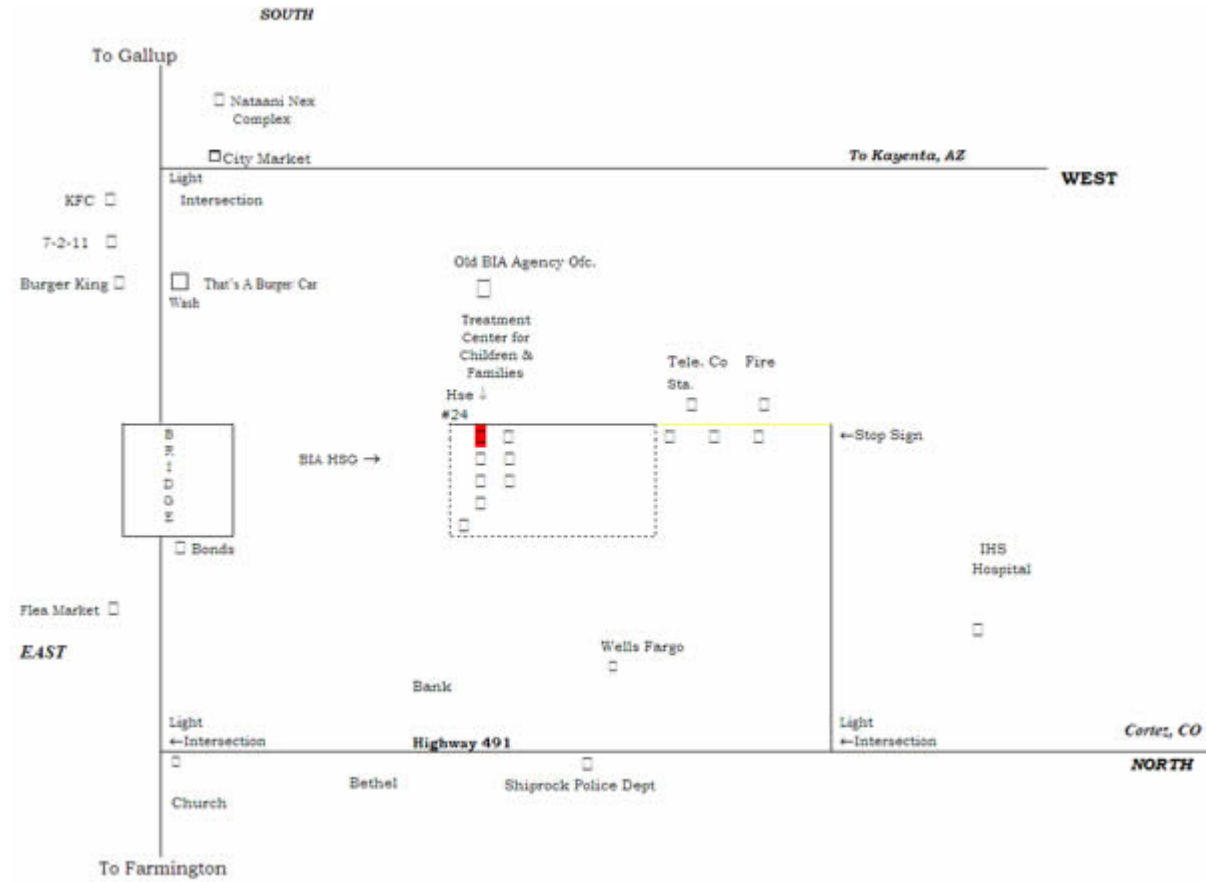

San Juan County Adolescent Residential Treatment Center is a 16-bed-psychiatric residential treatment facility for boys and girls ages 13-17 who are suffering with a wide range of emotional and behavioral problems. Adolescents served have either a behavioral disorder or a behavioral disorder co-occurring with substance abuse. SJCARTC is the only provider of comprehensive, residential-based mental health and substance abuse services for adolescents in the Four Corners Region.

To meet the criteria for admission, the teen must have tried less restrictive forms of intervention with little to no progress, entering the program from a more restrictive form of care; or entering the program through a court order in conjunction with probation requirements.

- Individual Therapy – Two, One hour sessions per week, treating emotional, behavioral and thought deficits contributing to their diagnosis.
- Group Therapy- Five, 60 to 90 minute sessions per week, to work on emotional, behavioral, or thought problems and to explore the problems and solutions within a social context provided by the group.

At the time of the referral, an Intake Specialist conducts comprehensive needs and risk assessment to help identify areas or programs available through community organizations, which may include a voluntary admission to the onsite residential treatment center, intensive outpatient program or shelter. Individualized referrals are made to local agencies that can help with issues such as anger management, education, employment, mental health, substance abuse, sex and dating, crisis, recreation, family services, parenting and more. The Intake Specialist making the referral is responsible for tracking the case and providing follow-up support. The objective of the Assessment Center is to identify at-risk youth in the community in need of intervention, connecting families with resources, assist juveniles and their families with present crisis, facilitate collaboration and communication among all agencies, and, most importantly, avoid unnecessary detention of juveniles.

Youth and families can utilize the services of the Assessment Center. Referrals will be taken by the following:

- Self-referrals
- Informal Juvenile Probation referrals
- Court Referrals
- Youth who have concerning behavior at home
- Truants/suspended/expelled students or those students not committing to school
- Parent/Families needing services as a result of child conflict
- In-State runaways to be transferred to the Crisis Shelter
- Youth do not meet secure detention criteria (at the recommendation of the on-call JPO)
- Youth identified by law enforcement as having concerning/at-risk behaviors.

Making an Appointment: Assessment is done between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Appointments and Walk –Ins are welcome. In case of emergency staff is on-call 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

NOTE: One or both parents/guardians MUST accompany the youth to the appointment.

Allow approximately two hours for the appointment. If you scheduled an appointment, you will be asked to provide:

- Contact information, including address, phone number, etc.
- Background information about youth (age, birth date, social security, etc.)
- Referral source (how you heard about us)
- Background on youth's situation

Frequently Asked Questions

Q: How much does your program cost?

A: There is no cost for this program.

Q: What resources/referrals do you provide?

A: The Assessment Center has listings for several programs in San Juan County from areas such as anger management, mental health, substance abuse, GED and educational services and many more.

Q. Can a police officer bring a child to the Assessment Center?

A: A police officer can bring a child to the Assessment Center if a parent has given the officer permission to transport the child.

Q: Does the Assessment Center provide any long-term or extensive mental health replacement or services:

A: The Assessment Center provides only assessment and referral services. No extensive mental health testing, placement or long-term services are provided.

Q: Does the Assessment Center accept children who are under the influence of a substance (alcohol, drugs, etc?)

A: The Assessment Center is not a de-tox unit for juveniles. Thorough screening will take place between Administration and Juvenile Probation on a case-by-case basis for holding juveniles under the influence of alcohol. The center provides referrals for juveniles who may have a substance abuse problem.

Q: Does my child have to come home with me even if the police bring him/her to the Assessment Center?

A: Yes. Parent/guardians must pick up their child, arrange for him/her to stay with a friend or relative, or arrange other placement. If parent/guardian refuses to pick up child and all other options are exhausted, Human Services becomes involved. Parents/guardian remain financially responsible for placement of their child.

Emergency Crisis Shelter:

- Works with direct connections to the Assessment Center and will provide short-term shelter for youths who are in need of housing, are nonviolent, and do not meet criteria for secure detention. The Crisis Shelter will serve males and females between the ages of 9 and 18 years of age for a maximum length of 72 hours (times does not include weekends and holidays).
- Youth are typically referred and admitted into the Shelter by law enforcement, assessment staff, outside agencies, or protective services. Although in many cases self-referrals are taken, and parent/guardians may also make referrals. In addition, if a juvenile is in secure detention, and the court deems he/she is not appropriate for secure holding but there are not parents to release the child to, the Shelter becomes an alternative placement option to secure detention for the juvenile. The Shelter collaborates with the Navajo Nation to provide services for youth who are in the custody of their system. There is a lack of services in the Navajo Nation for youth, which promotes the need for collaboration.

Hours of operation:

The Emergency Crisis Shelter operates 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Intake Eligibility Criteria:

- In-State Runaways
- Status offenders who are in need of short-term shelter
- Non-Violent Misdemeanors (after it has been determined by Juvenile Probation they cannot be held in secure detention)
- No charges – Law Enforcement has contact and no parents or guardians to release to.
- Temporarily Non-Secure holding for youth who are in need of shelter due to law enforcement contact with parents (i.e. domestic violence, both parents arrested)

Intake Non-Eligibility Criteria:

- Youth has a history of violent offenses.
- Youth has a warrant from District Court
- Youth is charged with violent crime (s) against a person.
- Youth is charged with possession of a deadly weapon.
- Youth is on formal probation and has new charges.
- Youth is being charged with multiple felonies.
- Out-of-State runaways.
- Misdemeanor charges against a person.
- Uncooperative youth or disagreeable parent or guardian.
- Youth displays aggressive or threatening behavior.
- Youth is presenting behaviors that indicate mental health issues that will require a high level of medical care.

Juvenile Detention:

The secure detention facility holds juveniles in custody for an alleged delinquent act, after a detention risk assessment instrument is completed and a determination is made that the child meets criteria for detention. The criteria for detention are pursuant to NM State Statute which governs the decisions for secure holding.

The detention center provides a secure, safe, and structured setting for juveniles ages 13 to 18 years old. Separate housing units are for males and females, as well as a fully staffed medical unit providing crisis rooms, and an isolation room which is used for contagious disease control. Education is provided for all juveniles through a partnership with Farmington Municipal School District. Juveniles receive education instruction by certified teachers, with one being certified in Special Education. All levels of education needs are met for juveniles within 24 hours of admission.

Programming consists of daily Life Skills courses, Art classes, Health and Nutrition, and Career Readiness. On a monthly basis, Safe Sex and Sexually Transmitted Disease information classes are provided by the Department of Health. Additionally, religious services are available to all residents through various community faith providers and a facility Chaplain.

All inmates must follow a behavior modification system, which is a system to help modify behavior through rewards or removal of rewards process.

Creating Lasting Family Connections (CLFC):

- The award winning Creating Lasting Family Connections program is a structured opportunity for families to improve their ability to provide young people with the skills they need to be successful in today's world. The CLFC curriculum is used in 40 states nationwide, providing an in-depth and systematic means to deal with the issues of alcohol and drug abuse and family enhancement.
- The COPES CLFC program takes approximately 9 weeks to complete at one class per week for parents and juveniles. The class will be broken into parent and juvenile groups of no more than 15 adults and 10 juveniles per group and will be held at the San Juan County Juvenile Detention Center located at 851 Andrea Drive at 6:00 p.m. on Thursdays.

This program is free of charge but will require an investment in time and energy on the part of the parent and the youth.
